The Monthly Activity Report delivers information about police department activities. It provides crime statistics, work volumes, Part 1 and nuisance crime, use of force stats and crime trends. The report highlights a snapshot of the typical cases handled by Santa Cruz Police Officers.

Chief Kevin Vogel stated that "by providing this monthly report to our community it will provide a better understanding of the public safety issues in our City as well as the outstanding work that our men and women do on a daily basis."

In addition to our Patrol workload, the Santa Cruz Police Department continues to support neighborhoods, community groups and business associations by engaging them in ways to protect themselves and their property. Community policing highlights are included in the monthly activity report.

Santa Cruz Police Department Highlights

The Santa Cruz Police Department welcomed three police officers to the team, all local residents of our community! The officers graduated a 22-week long Police Academy and must now successfully complete an 18-week Field Training Program before they are assigned to their new patrol beats. Also new to our Department are two Community Service Officers, they will also enter into our inhouse Field Training Program. We hope to fill the remaining vacancies in the Department and continue to deliver a high level of service to our community.

As the Department welcomes new officers, we also prepare to say good-bye to our Chief of Police Kevin Vogel, who announced his retirement effective June 2, 2017. In reflecting on his career, the Chief stated that "it has been a tremendous honor to work alongside the dedicated men and women in the Police Department, and to serve the Santa Cruz Community. I will miss each and every employee." The Chief was instrumental in deploying innovative technology such as the first police department mobile app in the country, as well as Predictive Policing, named one of the 50 best inventions of 2011 by Time Magazine. Following his departure, the Chief will shift his focus to spending more time with his family, traveling, and completing many unfinished home projects. Good luck Chief, we'll miss you!

In partnership with the Veterans Resource Center (VRC), the Department launched a pilot project to connect Veterans to housing and support services. Officers will transport Veterans to the VRC where they will be connected to qualifying housing, health, training and counseling services.

Santa Cruz Police Department Highlights

The Santa Cruz Police Department is pleased to announce its two new K9 teams, Officer Hansen and his partner Cash, and Officer Hernandez and his partner Luna. Both dogs recently graduated from their month-long K9 Handler Patrol Course and began patrolling the streets in December. Training included: Area and building searches, handler protection and apprehension, articles searches and tracking, as well as narcotic detection.

The Department recently launched a new webpage dedicated to cold cases, the first of its kind countywide. Leveraging social media communication, the website hopes to reach a greater audience that may have information and new leads to the highlighted cases. A cold case can be reopened if a relevant inquiry identifies new suspects or strengthens the case against known subjects. Advances in DNA technology and other forensic techniques have enabled law enforcement agencies to reopen and solve many cold cases.

Also on our website, the Department's policy manual is now accessible in its entirety. We embrace a culture of transparency and accountability in order to build public trust and legitimacy. Sharing our policies and practices helps the community better understand decision making.

Finally, our Chief of Police attended the Women's March planning meeting to speak on civil rights and public safety. The goal was to ensure the First Amendment Rights of those who wished to participate peacefully in any event on public property, are preserved and protected. An estimated 10,000 people marched, with no reported incidents of violence or vandalism.
