# 1. <u>June 13, 2018 Arts Commission Meeting Draft Minutes</u>

2. Unsolicited proposal: Bubbles at sunset by Rachel Miryam Smith. Request for \$612.00

Staff recommendation: Consider providing sponsorship. The AC may choose to provide a smaller amount than what is asked for.

Commissioner Meyer made a motion to support the request for the full amount. Commissioner Kershner seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

3. Placemaking in the Downtown: Where are we going?

Economic Development Director Bonnie Lipscomb gave a brief overview of our current vision to enhance downtown which will provide some context as we consider various art projects going forward. Projects presented in a quick summary included the library mixed use project, a possible new farmer's market location and amenities, the front street project/development and a small play area/ placemaking effort in the 1500 block

The Arts Commissioners discussed the benefits of a play area or sculpture downtown. Chair Williamson pointed out that these projects were already going forward - that the City had made the decision - and the Arts Commission was being asked for input or expertise on items related to public art - but not to decide whether or not they would go forward. Bonnie Lipscomb asked the group if they would like to provide input on artistic elements and the Commission indicated they would.

# 4. <u>Monuments and Memorials Discussion</u>

#### Staff Report/Background:

As a best practice the City should adopt a Memorials & Monuments policy. The Arts Program Manager could be the lead on referring a M&Ms policy to City Council if the Arts Commission wants to pursue that.

#### Staff Recommendation:

Arts Program Manager could draft and bring a Memorials & Monuments policy to the September Arts Commission meeting for review and at that meeting, if adopted, consider forwarding the policy to City Council for final approval.

Commissioner Lock made a motion to authorize staff to draft Memorials & Monuments Policy and bring it back in September for consideration. Commissioner Kershner seconded.

The motion passed unanimously.

#### **General Business**

2. Unsolicited proposal—Ibis Bike sculpture proposed by Ibis Bikes and Nick Taylor, Artist:

A large scale replica of the first Ibis mountain bike is being offered as a donation to the City. The estimated cost to install the work is around \$1500 which includes moving the sculpture from Marin and pouring a concrete pad for it to sit on. Staff estimates additional costs may add up to \$1,500 - such as a plaque or other incidentals. A specific location has not yet been determined for the work is appropriate near the Rail Trail and the Ibis Bikes headquarters on the west side of Santa Cruz. See attached photos and narrative.

<u>Staff recommendation</u>: Accept the sculpture for siting somewhere along the Rail Trail and direct staff to work with the artist, donor and Rail Trail subcommittee to determine location.

3. Unsolicited proposal—donation request for Tannery World Dance and Cultural Center (TWDCC) annual festival/fundraiser.

The Santa Cruz World Arts Festival will be held on October 13th &14th, 2018 at the Tannery Arts Center after taking last year off for lack of funding. TWDCC currently has 24 different World Arts Dance companies performing and are also highlighting artists of the African Diaspora in the Colligan theater this year. The Saturday, October 13th daytime festival is free and open to the public. See attached photos and narrative.

<u>Staff recommendation</u>: A motion to sponsor the event at the same level as in previous years -\$500.

#### **Ibis Maximus**

NARRATIVE PROPOSAL including the concept, media, dimensions, timeframe for completion, site
preparation requirements, method of installation and estimated annual maintenance costs, on no more
than 2 typed pages.

Ibis Maximus is a large steel sculpture of an oversized Ibis bicycle created by Nick Taylor of Ft. Bragg California. It is owned Ibis Cycles and is currently is on loan to the Mountain Bike Hall of Fame in Fairfax California. Max has been featured twice at Burning Man.

Maximus (or Max for short) is the brainchild and creation of sculptor Nick Taylor of Fort Bragg, CA. When asked to make a sign for his local Mendocino Coast Fat Tire Festival in the fall of 2011, he figured what better way to generate interest than with a big bike. He already had the tires, so he just build the bike around them.

"And what better model to use than my Mojo SL. As a sculptor, I love the lines of the Mojo."

The main frame is made from steel pipe, 4" in diameter with about 1/4" wall thickness, heavily manipulated and sculpted and welded, ground and filed by the artist. The forks, bars, stems and links are also custom made. The sculpture has repurposed tractor wheels and the patina of dark brown will remain over time. The anticipated cost of maintenance and clean up per year should be minimal to none with a coat of finish oil and paint to spruce it up every other year.

Even more impressive than the sheer scale of the project is the accuracy of the build. The frame isn't just a cursory scale reproduction of an Ibis Mojo SL carbon fiber bicycle; it could almost pass as a scale model. The suspension links and their mounting points are accurately placed, the rear triangle includes the single non-driveside reinforcement strut and asymmetrical chain stays, the fork lowers have bulged tops where the bushings and seals would normally go, and some parts like the Propedal lever on the FOX rear shock, the headset, and the wheels actually move appropriately. Long story short, if you had a 5 foot inseam, you could ride this piece of art.

The sculpture took Nick approximately 6 months to build which includes some modifications after the initial construction. The display stand bolts to the rear hub. For permanent mounting, Nick suggests mounts attaching to both hubs or the bottom bracket. It requires a forklift and two slings choked to the frame to be lifted. Site preparation requires flat, level ground at minimum or if cost allows, a poured concrete pad that is 9 feet by 15, with the bicycle to face the direction of the trail head / Wilder State Park.

The artist estimates that the cost of his personal time to install the work to be \$1500. The forklift rental and driver would be another estimated \$400 at either end so a total of another \$800. His installation fee does not include prepping ground/ laying any foundation/ constructing a concrete pad, if deemed needed, or actual cost of forklift rental / operator.


