Narrative:

On 10/16/16 at 0530 hours, I received a call at home from Chief Inspector MIchael Roe. He advised that there had been an Officer Involved Critical Incident involving Officers from the Santa Cruz Police Department. Roe requested that I respond to the Santa Cruz Police Department to assist with the Investigation. Upon my arrival, it was determined by the

Management Team that I would conduct the process to document the involved and witness officers uniforms and duty equipment and collect the relevant evidence.

DOCUMENTATION AND COLLECTION OF OFFICERS DUTY EQUIPMENT:

The following section documents the initial collection of the evidence. A more in depth analysis of the equipment is documented later in this report.

I coordinated with Lt. Jose Garcia, the SCPD Administrative Liaison, and Sgt. Carter Jones, the SCPOA President and officers representative, to collect the equipment. I was provided a private, discreet office, normally assigned to a criminal analyst, in the Administration Division to conduct the collection. Lt. Garcia obtained replacement duty pistols to provide to the officers upon my collection of their duty pistols. Sgt. Jones was responsible to bring the officers to me. Jones was also present with all four of the officers as their equipment was collected. Sgt. Jones had previously ensured that the officers were dressed in the exact same manner that they were during the incident.

ERIK BAILEY #146

Sgt. Jones brought in Ofc. Erik Bailey at approximately 0735 hours. Bailey had been previously identified to me as the only known officer who had fired his handgun.

I identified myself to Bailey and explained the process. He acknowledged that he understood the procedure. I confirmed with Bailey that his current appearance was the same as his appearance at the time of the incident. I photographed Bailey in his uniform and hat.

Bailey provided me with his duty belt, which I documented as evidence number APT-1, and all of the equipment associated with it. In addition to the duty equipment on his belt, Bailey provided me with several additional weapons. Bailey kept a Glock Mod. 27 Pistol in a panel holster in the front of his ballistic vest carrier, under his uniform shirt. This weapon was documented as APT-4. I photographed the pistol in the vest carrier holster. Bailey stated that this weapon was a personally owned pistol and that his primary duty weapon (APT-7) was departmentally owned and issued to him.

I removed the magazine (APT-5) from the pistol and immediately noted that the magazine was a Glock .40S&W 9 round magazine and the round count indicators on the back of the magazine showed that there were 9 rounds in the magazine. I rendered the weapon safe by locking the slide back. When I locked the slide back, I observed a single .40 S&W cartridge (APT-6) that had been extracted from the chamber. I packaged the pistol, magazine and single chambered round.

Bailey provided me a knife (APT-2) from his right sap pants pocket and another knife (APT-3) from his left front pants pocket. I photographed Bailey's police handheld radio and keys and released them back to him, as they were of no further evidentiary value. I explained to Bailey that I had completed my initial examination and inquired if he had any questions. He responded that he did not. Bailey was informed that he could change out of his uniform if he so desired and to wait until the next phase of the investigation. I thanked Bailey for his cooperation and Sgt. Jones escorted Bailey out of the room.

I continued the initial documentation and collection on Bailey's equipment. I photographed Bailey's primary duty pistol (APT-7), which was secured in the holster on his duty belt. The holster was set up for a right handed shooter. I removed the gun from the holster, which was functioning properly in retaining the gun. I removed the magazine (APT-8) from the pistol and noted that the magazine was a Glock .40S&W 15 round magazine, however the round count indicators on the back of the magazine showed that there were only 13 rounds in the magazine. I rendered the weapon safe by locking the slide back. When I locked the slide back, I observed a single .40 S&W cartridge (APT-9) that had been extracted from the chamber. I packaged the pistol, magazine and single chambered round. I also packaged the duty belt and remaining equipment.

OFFICER DENISE COCKRUM #132

Sgt. Jones brought in Ofc. Denise Cockrum at approximately 0810 hours. I identified myself to Cockrum and explained the process. She acknowledged that she understood the procedure. I confirmed with Cockrum that her current appearance was the same as her appearance at the time of the incident Cockrum added that she was wearing black latex gloves at the time. I did not have Cockrum put on gloves for this procedure. I photographed Cockrum in her uniform.

Cockrum provided me with her duty belt (APT-15) and all of the equipment associated with it. In addition to the duty equipment on her belt, Cockrum provided me with an additional weapon, a knife (APT-16) from her left front pants pocket. Cockrum also produced a flashlight (APT-17) from her left pant leg cargo pocket. I photographed Cockrum's police handheld radio and keys and released them back to her, as they were of no further evidentiary value. Cockrum told me that her duty pistol (APT-23) was departmentally owned and issued to her.

I explained to Cockrum that I had completed my initial examination and inquired if she had any questions. She responded that she did not. Cockrum was informed that she could change out of her uniform if she so desired and to wait until the next phase of the investigation. I thanked Cockrum for her cooperation and Sgt. Jones escorted Cockrum out of the room.

I continued the initial equipment documentation and collection on Cockrum's equipment. I started with Cockrum's primary duty pistol (APT-23), which was secured in the holster on her duty belt. The holster was set up for a right handed shooter. I removed the gun from the holster, which was functioning properly in retaining the gun. I then removed the magazine (APT-24) from the pistol and noted that it was a Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicators on the back of the magazine showed that it contained 17 rounds. I rendered the weapon safe by locking the slide back. When I locked the slide back, I observed a single 9mm cartridge (APT-25) that had been extracted from the chamber. I packaged the pistol, magazine and single chambered round. I also packaged the duty belt and remaining equipment.

OFFICER ADAM BAKER#159

Sgt. Jones brought in Ofc. Adam Baker at approximately 0835 hours. I identified myself to Baker and explained the process. He acknowledged that he understood the procedure. I

confirmed with Baker that his current appearance was the same as his appearance at the time of the incident. Baker added that he was wearing black latex gloves at the time. I did not have Baker put on gloves for this procedure. I photographed Baker in his uniform.

Baker provided me with his duty belt (APT-26) and all of the equipment associated with it. In addition to the duty equipment on his belt, Baker provided me with two additional weapons. The first was a knife (APT-27) from his left sap pocket. Baker also produced another knife (APT-28) from the left side of the front of his ballistic vest carrier. I photographed Baker's police handheld radio and keys and released them back to him, as they were of no further evidentiary value. Baker told me that his duty pistol (APT-29) was departmentally owned and issued to him.

I explained to Baker that I had completed my initial examination and inquired if he had any questions. He responded that he did not. Baker was informed that he could change out of his uniform if he so desired and to wait until the next phase of the investigation. I thanked Baker for his cooperation and Sqt. Jones escorted Baker out of the room.

I continued the initial equipment documentation and collection on Baker's equipment. I started with Baker's primary duty pistol (APT-29), which was secured in the holster on his duty belt. The holster was set up for a right handed shooter. I removed the gun from the holster, which was functioning properly in retaining the gun. I then removed the magazine (APT-30) from the pistol and noted that it was a Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicators on the back of the magazine showed that it contained 17 rounds. I rendered the weapon safe by locking the slide back. When I locked the slide back, I observed a single 9mm cartridge (APT-31) that had been extracted from the chamber. I packaged the pistol, magazine and single chambered round. I also packaged the duty belt and remaining equipment.

SGT. WILLIAM CLAYTON #119

Sgt. Jones brought in Sgt. William "Bill" Clayton at approximately 0905 hours. I identified myself to Clayton and explained the process. He acknowledged that he understood the procedure. Sgt. Jones had stepped away at this point. I confirmed with Clayton that he was willing to go forward without Sgt. Jones present. Clayton stated that he was comfortable continuing without Sgt. Jones. I confirmed with Clayton that his current appearance was the same as his appearance at the time of the incident. I photographed Clayton in his uniform and hat.

Clayton provided me with his duty belt (APT-37) and all of the equipment associated with it. In addition to the duty equipment on his belt, Clayton provided me with two additional weapons. The first was a revolver (APT-41) from a holster attached to the straps of his ballistic vest carrier on the right side of his torso. Clayton explained that this was a personally owned weapon. The revolver was a Smith and Wesson Mod. 442 .38 SPL. Clayton removed the gun from the holster, He opened the cylinder to make the weapon safe, before I could instruct him not to and note where the cylinder lined up with the frame. The revolver had 5 live .38 SPL rounds in the cylinder. I removed the rounds from the weapon and packaged the two items.

In addition, Clayton produced a knife (APT-43) from his left front pants pocket. I photographed Clayton's police handheld radio and keys and released them back to him, as they were of no further evidentiary value. Clayton told me that his duty pistol (APT-38) was departmentally owned and issued to him.

I explained to Clayton that I had completed my initial examination and inquired if he had any questions. He responded that he did not. Clayton was informed that he could change out of his uniform if he so desired and to wait until the next phase of the investigation. I thanked Clayton for his cooperation and Sgt. Jones escorted Clayton out of the room.

I continued the initial equipment documentation and collection on Clayton's equipment. I started with Clayton's primary duty pistol (APT-38), which was secured in the holster on his duty belt. The holster was set up for a right handed shooter. I removed the gun from the holster, which was functioning properly in retaining the gun. I then removed the magazine (APT-39) from the pistol and noted that it was a Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicators on the back of the magazine showed that it contained 17 rounds. I rendered the weapon safe by locking the slide back. When I locked the slide back, I observed a single 9mm cartridge (APT-40) that had been extracted from the chamber. I packaged the pistol, magazine and single chambered round. I also packaged the duty belt and remaining equipment.

All of the photos of the Officer's appearance and duty equipment were put onto a CD and documented as APT-52.

ONGOING INVESTIGATION:

At approximately 1020 hours, I was notified that the digital recorder (**APT-50**) on Clayton's duty belt was used during the incident and recorded the event. I discussed this detail with Insp. Patrick Murray, who had been designated as the Lead Investigator. He and I concurred that I would collect the recording from Clayton's recorder.

APT-50 is an Olympus unknown model digital recorder. I connected a mini-USB cable from the recorder to my Forensic Laptop (FC03). Using Windows Explorer, I navigated to the folder structure on APT-50. I located a single recording on the device. The fie was named "VN520883" and is a WMA file type. The recording was 9m12s in length. The file indicated that it was created on 10/16/16 at 0307 hours. This time is based upon the time that the recorder displays. Upon reviewing the recorder, I noted that the time on the recorder appears to be delayed by approximately 43 minutes. That would put the actual time of the recording around 0350 hours.

I put the recording onto a CD and documented it as **APT-51**. I maintained the original disk as evidence. I created two copies. I gave Murray one for the investigation and one to Sgt. Arnold Vasquez for SCPD.

Chief Insp. Roe and I then transported APT-1 through APT-50 to the District Attorney's Office Bureau of Investigations evidence room for storage until I could conduct a further examination.

Upon returning to the Santa Cruz Police Dept., I provided Sgt. Vasquez with copies of the hand written property reports I generated for items APT-1 to 50.

MOBILE PHONE FORENSIC EXAMINATION:

At approximately 1220 hours, Insp. Katrina Rogers indicated that she had collected a mobile phone from the decedent's father, Arlt. Rogers provided me with an Apple iPhone 6, a consent to search form and the passcode (1105). I put the phone into Airplane Mode, removed it from it's protective case and disabled the passcode and screen timeout. I documented the phone as APT-54, as well as providing it with a Computer Forensic Unit Alpha/Numeric ID of P1.

I began a File System Extraction on the phone. However, after approximately 40 minutes, Rogers came to me and explained that Arlt had withdrawn his Consent. I terminated the extraction immediately. I returned the phone to it's case, re-applied the passcode and disabled Airplane Mode. I returned the phone to Rogers.

EXAMINATION OF DUTY EQUIPMENT:

On 10/17/16 at approximately 1800 hours, I began the examination of the duty equipment I previously collected and documented as APT-1 to APT-50.

The following is a detailed account of my examination and the relevant notations. I examined the equipment, sorted by each officer involved. All examinations of the duty belts were conducted going from left to right as the belt was laid out. This is not indicative of how the equipment was positioned in relation to their person. Refer to the initial duty equipment collection photos on APT-52 to understand how any item of equipment was positioned on their person.

All of the following evidence was photographed. I put all of the photos onto a CD and documented it as APT-53.

OFC. BAILEY:

Bailey was wearing a duty belt (APT-1) secured to an under belt with keepers. I photographed the belt in it's entirety. The contents of the belt are as follows:

- Double Magazine case with closed top button flaps that contained 2 magazines (APT-12 from the left side pocket and APT-13 from the right side pocket)
- Taser (APT-14) in polymer Taser holster. The holster is a right handed holster and was positioned on Bailey's left hip in a "Cross Draw" manner.
- Collapsible Baton (APT-10) in polymer holster
- · Radio Holder
- · Flashlight (APT-11) in leather holder
- · Pistol Holster (Right Hand) for APT-7.
- Double Handcuff case- Front slot was empty. Rear slot had one set of stainless handcuffs. There were 2 handcuff keys clipped to the top of the case flap.

- **APT-2** is a black folding pocket knife with a 3.5 inch blade. It is marked with "USMC" on the clip and "Marines" on the blade. Bailey provided this item to me from his right sap pocket.
- **APT-3** is a black Benchmade auto-opening knife with a silver release button. The blade is 3 inches in length. The pocket clip had been broken off prior to my receipt.
- APT-4, Bailey's secondary weapon, is a Glock Model 27 Gen 4 Semi-automatic pistol chambered in .40S&W. It consists of a metal slide attached to a polymer frame. The gun is all black in color and bears the serial number ZAR012. I examined the pistol and I located no damage, modifications or unusual wear. All of the safeties appeared to be functioning properly. The pistol functioned properly in dry fire testing and cycling.
- APT-5 is the magazine that I had removed from APT-4. APT-5 is a black polymer and metal Glock .40S&W 9 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it had 9 rounds in it. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 9 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester .40S&W marked with the headstamp "WIN 40 S&W".
- APT-6 was the round removed from the chamber of APT-4. It was a Winchester .40S&W marked with the headstamp "WIN 40 S&W".
- APT-7, Bailey's Primary Duty Weapon, is a Glock Model 22 Gen 4 Semi-automatic pistol chambered in .40S&W. It consists of a metal slide attached to a polymer frame. The gun is all black in color and bears the serial number XNY274. I examined the pistol and I located no damage, modifications or unusual wear. All of the safeties appeared to be functioning properly. The pistol functioned properly in dry fire testing and cycling.
- APT-8 is the magazine that I had removed from APT-7. APT-8 is a black polymer and metal Glock .40S&W 15 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it had 13 rounds in it. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 13 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester .40S&W marked with the headstamp "WIN 40 S&W". The magazine had "146" etched on the left side.
- **APT-9** was the round removed from the chamber of **APT-7**. It was a Winchester .40S&W marked with the headstamp "WIN 40 S&W".
- **APT-10** is a collapsible Baton that had no external markings. The baton functioned properly and showed no signs of current use or unusual wear.
- **APT-11** is a Pelican 7060 LED Flashlight. It had a worn, user applied label that read "14". The light functioned properly.
- **APT-12** is a black polymer and metal Glock .40S&W 15 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it contained 15 rounds. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 15 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester .40S&W marked with the headstamp "WIN 40 S&W". The magazine had "146" etched on the left side.

APT-13 is a black polymer and metal Glock .40S&W 15 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it contained 15 rounds. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 15 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester .40S&W. Some of the rounds were marked with the headstamp "WIN 40 S&W" and others "WINCHESTER 40S&W". The magazine had "146" etched on the left side.

APT-14 is a Taser Model X2 bearing serial number X290045H9 and had a user applied barcode sticker that read "SANTA CRUZ POLICE 00526" The Taser safety lever was in the "Safe/Off" position. I activated the safety lever to the "Armed/ On" Position and it appeared to be functioning correctly. The Taser had two live cartridges loaded in it.

I packaged all of Bailey's equipment and returned it to evidence storage.

OFC. COCKRUM:

Cockrum was wearing a duty belt (APT-15) secured to an under belt with keepers. I photographed the belt in it's entirety. The contents of the belt are as follows:

- · Flashlight (APT-18) in leather flashlight holder
- Double Magazine case with closed top button flaps that contained 2 magazines (APT-19 from the left side pocket and APT-20 from the right side pocket)
- Taser (APT-21) in polymer Taser holster. The holster is a right handed holster and was positioned on Cockrum'sleft hip in a "Cross Draw" manner.
- · Collapsible Baton (APT-22) in leather holster
- Radio Holder
- · Key Keeper
- Duty Pistol Holster (Right hand) for APT-23
- Double Handcuff case with button close top flap. Contained 2 sets of Handcuffs

APT-16 is a Kershaw silver folding knife with a 3.25 inch blade and a pocket clip. Cockrum provided me this item from her left pants pocket.

APT-17 is a Pelican 7060 LED Flashlight. It had a worn, user applied label that read "2". The light functioned properly. Cockrum provided this to me from her left side pants cargo pocket.

APT-18 is a Techlite Lumen Master flashlight that functioned but showed some wear.

APT-19 is a black polymer and metal Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it contained 17 rounds. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 17 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester 9mm rounds marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3".

APT-20 is a black polymer and metal Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it contained 17 rounds. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 17 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester 9mm rounds marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3".

APT-21 is a Taser Model X2 bearing serial number **X290031YY** and had a user applied barcode sticker that read "SANTA CRUZ POLICE 00491" The Taser safety lever was in the "Safe/Off" position. I activated the safety lever to the "Armed/ On" Position and it appeared to be functioning correctly. The Taser had two live cartridges loaded in it.

APT-22 is a collapsible Baton that had no external markings. The baton functioned properly and showed no signs of current use or unusual wear.

APT-23 is Cockrum's Primary Duty Weapon, and is a Glock Model 17 Gen 4 Semi-automatic pistol chambered in 9X19 (9mm). It consists of a metal slide attached to a polymer frame. The gun is all black in color and bears the serial number TXR241. I examined the pistol and I located no damage, modifications or unusual wear. All of the safeties appeared to be functioning properly. The pistol functioned properly in dry fire testing and cycling.

APT-24 is the magazine that I had removed from APT-23. APT-24 is a black polymer and metal Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it contained 17 rounds. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 17 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester 9mm rounds marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3".

APT-25 was the round removed from the chamber of **APT-23**. The round is a Winchester 9mm round marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3".

I packaged all of Cockrum's equipment and returned it to evidence storage.

OFC. BAKER:

Baker was wearing a duty belt (APT-26) secured to an under belt with keepers. I photographed the belt in it's entirety. The contents of the belt are as follows:

- · Key Keeper
- · Duty Pistol Holster for APT-29
- Metal Key Clip
- Double Handcuff case with button close top flap. Contained 2 sets of Handcuffs
- Double Magazine case with closed top button flaps that contained 2 magazines (APT-32 from the left side pocket and APT-33 from the right side pocket)
- Taser (APT-34) in polymer Taser holster. The holster is a right handed holster and was positioned on Baker's left hip in a "Cross Draw" manner.
- · Collapsible Baton (APT-35) in polymer holder
- · Radio holder
- · Flashlight (APT-36) in leather holder

APT-27 is a Benchmade black folding knife with a 3 inch blade. Baker provided this knife to me from his left sap pocket.

APT-28 is a Spyderco silver folding knife with a 3.75 inch blade. Baker provided this item to me from a slot on the upper left side of the front of his ballistic vest carrier, beneath his uniform shirt.

- APT-29 is Baker's Primary Duty Weapon, and is a Glock Model 17 Gen 4 Semi-automatic pistol chambered in 9X19 (9mm). It consists of a metal slide attached to a polymer frame. The gun is all black in color and bears the serial number BAGR834. The pistol had a Streamlight TLR-1 HL weapon mounted flashlight attached to the rail mount. The light functioned properly. The pistol also had an aftermarket rubber grip sleeve added. I examined the pistol and I located no damage, modifications or unusual wear. All of the safeties appeared to be functioning properly. The pistol functioned properly in dry fire testing and cycling.
- APT-30 is the magazine that I had removed from APT-29. APT-30 is a black polymer and metal Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it contained 17 rounds. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 17 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester 9mm rounds marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3".
- **APT-31** was the round removed from the chamber of **APT-29**. The round is a Winchester 9mm round marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3".
- **APT-32** is a black polymer and metal Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it contained 17 rounds. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 17 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester 9mm rounds marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3".
- APT-33 is a black polymer and metal Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it contained 17 rounds. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 17 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester 9mm rounds marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3".
- APT-34 is a Taser Model X2 bearing serial number X290045F5 and had a user applied barcode sticker that read "SANTA CRUZ POLICE 00513" The Taser safety lever was in the "Safe/Off" position. I activated the safety lever to the "Armed/ On" Position and it appeared to be functioning correctly. The Taser had two empty, deployed cartridges loaded in it.
- **APT-35** is a collapsible Baton that had no external markings. The baton functioned properly and showed no signs of current use or unusual wear.
- APT-36 is a Streamlight Strion LED flashlight bearing a manufacturer applied number of 469778 0314. The light functioned properly.

I packaged all of Baker's equipment and returned it to evidence storage.

SGT. CLAYTON:

Clayton was wearing a duty belt (APT-37) secured to an under belt with keepers. I photographed the belt in it's entirety. The contents of the belt are as follows:

Double Magazine case with closed top button flaps that contained 2 magazines (APT-44 from the left side pocket and APT-45 from the right side pocket)

- Taser (APT-46) in polymer Taser holster. The holster is a right handed holster and was positioned on Clayton's left hip in a "Cross Draw" manner.
- · Collapsible Baton (APT-47) in leather holder
- · Radio Holder
- Flashlight in leather holder
- Key Keeper
- Duty Pistol Holster for APT-38
- Leather holder with button flap for digital recorder (APT-50)
- · O.C. Spray (APT-49) in leather holder
- Double Handcuff case with button close top flap. Contained 2 sets of Handcuffs and one handcuff key clipped to inside edge of case.

APT-38 is Clayton's Primary Duty Weapon, and is a Glock Model 17 Gen 4 Semi-automatic pistol chambered in 9X19 (9mm). It consists of a metal slide attached to a polymer frame. The gun is all black in color and bears the serial number XWM495. I examined the pistol and I located no damage, modifications or unusual wear. All of the safeties appeared to be functioning properly. The pistol functioned properly in dry fire testing and cycling.

APT-39 is the magazine that I had removed from APT-38. APT-39 is a black polymer and metal Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it contained 17 rounds. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 17 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester 9mm rounds marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3". An owner applied label of "119" was on the bottom of the rear face of the magazine.

APT-40 was the round removed from the chamber of **APT-38**. The round is a Winchester 9mm round marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3".

APT-41, Clayton's secondary weapon, is a Smith and Wesson Model 442 "Airweight" 5 round revolver chambered in .38 SPL. The gun is all black in color and bears the serial number CJY1197. I examined the pistol and I located no damage, modifications or unusual wear. The pistol functioned properly in dry fire testing and cycling.

APT-42 were the 5 rounds removed from the cylinder of APT-41. They were all Hornady .38 SPL rounds with "HORNADY 38 SPL +P" on the headstamp. All of the rounds were live. None of them had been expended or fired.

APT-43 was a Smith and Wesson black and copper colored folding knife with a 3.5 inch blade. The knife had a pocket clip and an owner applied label of "126" on the handle.

APT-44 is a black polymer and metal Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it contained 17 rounds. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 17 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester 9mm rounds marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3". An owner applied label of "119" was on the bottom of the rear face of the magazine.

APT-45 is a black polymer and metal Glock 9mm 17 round magazine. The round count indicator showed that it contained 17 rounds. I emptied the magazine and confirmed that it did in fact contain 17 rounds. All of rounds were Winchester 9mm rounds marked with the headstamp "WCC +P+ 1 3". An owner applied label of "119" was on the bottom of the rear face of the magazine.

APT-46 is a Taser Model X2 bearing serial number X290031XH and had a user applied barcode sticker that read "SANTA CRUZ POLICE 00485" The Taser safety lever was in the "Safe/Off" position. I activated the safety lever to the "Armed/ On" Position and it appeared to be functioning correctly. The Taser had an empty, deployed Cartridge in the Cartridge 1 position. Cartridge 2 had not been deployed.

APT-47 is a collapsible Baton that had no external markings other than an owner applied label of "126" on the neck. The baton functioned properly and showed no signs of current use or unusual wear.

APT-48 is a Pelican 7060 LED Flashlight. It had 2 worn, user applied labels that read "126" and "119". The light functioned properly.

APT-49 is a MK-6 canister of O.C. spray. I did not test the device, I only documented it. It bore a lot number of 930-278034.

APT-50 is a digital recorder that has previously been documented. It contained only the single recording.

I packaged all of Baker's equipment and returned it to evidence storage.

NEIGHBORHOOD CANVAS:

On 10/18/16 at approximately 1130 hours, I assisted Insp. Rogers with a neig	hbor hood
canvas in the Area of Chace and Getchell St.'s. I spoke to one neighbor,	,
who lived at Getchell. She indicated that she wanted to speak to us, how	ever, she had to
take her husband to an appointment. A short time later she returned and spo	ke to Rogers
and I. I recorded the interview. Refer to Rogers report regarding	statement and
Rogers' full investigation. I later placed the interview onto a CD and documen	ited it as APT-
63.	

TASER DATA EXTRACTION:

On 10/19/16 at 1100 hours, I met with Watsonville Police Sgt. Mike Ridgway. Ridgway is the WPD Lead Taser Instructor and is also certified by TASER as a Master instructor. Ridgway is authorized to conduct the data extractions from tasers. Ridgway conducted extractions from APT-14, APT-21, APT-34 and APT-46. These were all done in my presence. Ridgway connected each Taser to a computer using a specialized USB connection peripheral device and specialized Taser software.

Ridgway generated reports for all four devices and provided me with electronic and paper copies of the reports. All of the electronic reports were later placed onto a CD and documented as APT-55. Ridgway reviewed the reports with me and explained the results, which I included below. It should be noted that I did not get the entire device history. I instructed Ridgway to include activity from the previous day, prior to the event, in which there was activity to show the chronology before, during and after the event up to the present.

Ridgway also explained to me the nomenclature and functionality of the device. For reference, when looking down at the top of the weapon as it is facing away from you, Cartridge 1 would be on the left side and Cartridge 2 on the right (when looking at the deployment end of the weapon, Cartridge 1 would be on the right and Cartridge 2 on the left). This is the order they would deploy based upon default settings, however they can be overridden. This is also how I documented the cartridges when I removed them from the Tasers. They are documented as APT-14 a/b, APT-21 a/b, APT-34 a/b and APT-46 a/b with "a" being Cartridge 1 and "b" being Cartridge 2. I put all of the photos of the cartridges onto a CD and documented that as APT-62.

APT-14 (45H9-Bailey) Showed no use the day of the event (10/16/16). The device history showed that the last activity prior to the event was on 10/12/16 at 1421 hours and was an "Armed/Safe" event that lasted less than 1 second.

APT-21 (31YY-Cockrum) Showed no use the day of the event. The device history showed that the last activity prior to the event was on 10/15/16 at 2332 hours and was an "Armed/Arc/Safe" event that lasted 12 seconds.

APT-34 (45F5-Baker) showed the following use the day of the event (see log for further detail):

This device showed that at 03:41.46 the trigger was pulled and Cartridge 1 deployed for 5 seconds. The trigger was pulled again at 03:41.48 and Cartridge 2 deployed for 3 seconds. The Taser was then put on "Safe" at 03:41.51.

Upon reviewing the Pulse Log Graph for Cartridge 1 (TASER_X2_504_pulse_graphs.pdf), it showed that there was never a connection between the probes, indicating that the necessary circuit was never completed and the deployment was ineffective.

Upon reviewing the Pulse Log Graph for Cartridge 2 (TASER_X2_505_pulse_graphs.pdf), it showed that there was never a connection between the probes, indicating that the necessary circuit was never completed and the deployment was ineffective.

APT-46 (31XH-Clayton) showed the following use the day of the event (see log for further detail):

16 Oct 2016 03:41:56 Armed 27 83 16 Oct 2016 03:42:04 Trigger C1: Deployed 6 sec 16 Oct 2016 03:42:08 Arc 2 sec C1: Deployed C2: 25' Standard 16 Oct 2016 03:42:28 Safe

This device showed that at 03:42.04 the trigger was pulled and Cartridge 1 deployed for 6 seconds. At 03:42.08 an "Arc" was performed for 2 seconds. An "Arc' is when a previously deployed cartridge is manually reactivated on the weapon with a push of a button (not the trigger).

Upon reviewing the two Pulse Log Graphs for Cartridge 1 (TASER_X2_1004_pulse_graphs.pdf and TASER_X2_1005_pulse_graphs.pdf), it showed that there was never a connection between the probes, indicating that the necessary circuit was never completed and the deployment was ineffective. It should be noted that Pulse Graph 1005 shows activity on Cartridge 2, however this is common due to the "Arc" function stimulating both Cartridges. Cartridge 2 was never deployed.

Ridgway indicated that it appeared that all of the tasers were functioning properly, according to the Taser Sync software.

I kept APT-34 a&b and APT-46a, the deployed cartridges, as evidence. I later returned the live, undeployed cartridges to SCPD.

MOBILE PHONE FORENSIC EXAMINATION:

On 10/19/20 Murray advised that SCPD was requesting assistance with the decedent's cell phone. Arlt wanted to recover data from his son's phone for the purpose of identifying contacts and contact information, as well as obtaining photos, from the phone. He was willing to consent to search the phone for that purpose. I spoke to Det. Brian Warren, who had been tasked with Arlt's request. Warren retrieved the phone from the property unit.

I met with Warren at SCPD on 10/19/16 at 1400 hours. I opened the foil envelope and discovered an Apple iPhone 5c White Model A1532. The phone was documented by Warren with SCPD Evidence number 154BW-016. I documented the phone with a Computer Forensic Unit Alpha/Numeric ID of P2. I did not assign it my own "APT" evidence number since I never took sole possession of the device.

When I tried to power on the phone, it reported that it had a severely depleted battery. I found a stand alone Apple charger and put the phone on the charger for approximately 15 minutes. It ultimately powered on and I noted that it was passcode protected. I was also unable to activate Airplane Mode due to OS limitations. Warren and I compiled a list of numbers that might be of relevance, however I was unable to guess the passcode. I left the phone with Warren since there was no feasible way to access the contents of the phone without the

passcode. Warren indicated that he would contact Arlt and try to obtain the passcode or other possible solutions from the decedent's child's mother.

Sgt. Vasquez also provided me with a box each of 9mm and .40 S&W SCPD duty ammunition for testing purposes.

FIREARMS TESTING AND BALLISTIC CAPTURES:

On 10/20/16 at 0850, I went to the Watsonville Airport Range and I conducted further analysis and collected ballistic samples from all 6 firearms involved.

I used the 9mm and .40 S&W duty ammunition that Vasquez provided. Insp. Murray provided two .38 SPL. factory rounds for me that I used for APT-41, Clayton's revolver. I conducted the following process on each gun individually

I put 2 rounds into the magazines that I had previously removed from the weapons upon the initial collection (I put two rounds into the cylinder of APT-41). I fired both rounds into a ballistic capture material to preserve the rounds. I collected the 2 spent brass casings from the ground and packaged them together. Insp. Murray observed the casings as they ejected from the weapon to ensure their validity. I then removed the projectiles from capture material and packaged them together.

All 6 of the weapons fired, functioned and cycled properly. There were no noticeable deviations from the proper functionality of the weapon. I did not test the weapons for accuracy. The evidence was documented as follows.

APT-56a - Spent Casings from APT-4 (Bailey Secondary Pistol)

APT-56b - Projectiles from APT-4

APT-57a - Spent Casings from APT-7 (Bailey Primary Pistol)

APT-57b - Projectiles from APT-7

APT-58a - Spent Casings from APT-23 (Cockrum)

APT-58b - Projectiles from APT-23

APT-59a - Spent Casings from APT-29 (Baker)

APT-59b - Projectiles from APT-29

APT-60a - Spent Casings from APT-38 (Clayton Primary Pistol)

APT-60b - Projectiles from APT-38

APT-61a - Spent Casings from APT-41 (Clayton secondary Revolver)

APT-61b - Projectiles from APT-41

Each item was packaged individually. All the individual envelopes were then packaged together.
