The east portion of this building was constructed in 1925, designed by local architect, Lee Dill Esty, as W. H. Crowe and Son's Garage as an automobile salesroom. The building at that time was located on an interior lot, and the two-story rear wing had not yet been built.

In the early 1930s, Chase Mortuary moved into the building from an older building they had occupied to the west (the center of the current site), and demolished their old building while expanding the new mortuary facility across the rear of the now larger site. In more recent times, the house to the front of the two-story addition as well as an additional house to the west were demolished to accommodate an additional one-story addition and construction of an onsite parking lot. The two additions have maintained the original Spanish Eclectic character of the 1925 Esty design. The building has been occupied by various other commercial enterprises since vacated by Chase Mortuary.



Lee Dill Esty

Lee Dill Esty was born in Maine in 1876, and came to Santa Cruz as a child in 1879. The son of J.D. Esty, an early Santa Cruz County Supervisor, Esty was associated with the early Arts-and-Crafts movement and was an employee of prominent California architect, Julia Morgan. In Santa Cruz, he designed the Pogonip Club House, the replica of the Santa Cruz Mission, Santa Cruz City Hall, the Modern Baking Company, and various auto-related buildings in downtown Santa Cruz. He also designed private residences in Santa Cruz County. In 1931, he went into business with C. J. Ryland and D. M. McPhetres. Lee Dill Esty died in 1943.

SIGNIFICANCE

The property was not found eligible for the California Register of Historical Resources. The original building (now a easterly wing) and later expanded building, while significant to the development of the downtown, as an important auto garage and then local mortuary would not appear to be eligible under Criterion (1) due to recent alterations. The early person associated with the building was W. H. Crowe, and although Crowe was an early auto sales dealer, he is not known for contributions that are important to the development of the local community, therefore the property would not appear to be eligible for the California Register under Criterion (2). The specific architect of the original building is Lee Dill Esty, however the property was not found eligible for listing under Criterion (3), as the building is not a distinctive representative of Esty's work in it's current expanded form. The modifications have not destroyed the building's stylistic significance in the context of downtown Santa Cruz, but it no longer is clearly representative of the original design of Esty.

When considered for listing within the Historic Building Survey of the City of Santa Cruz, the property meets the following criteria:

- 1. The building is a significant example of the built environment heritage of the City as a representative of early twentieth century commercial architecture from the Interwar period, associated with the early development of the community; and
- 5. The building possesses special aesthetic merit and value due to its quality of architecture, retaining sufficient features that show its architectural significance; and
- 7. The building, although expanded over the years, retains sufficient integrity to accurately convey its significance from its early construction period.

<u>Integrity</u>

The property maintains most of its apparent historical integrity as per the National Register's seven aspects of integrity. It maintains its original location on Walnut Street in the downtown area of Santa Cruz. The property is still surrounded by most of its apparent historic setting, including surrounding commercial buildings of similar age, scale and design and parcels with similar setbacks, parking, and streetscape. The building retains its commercial scale and feeling and continues, through its form, massing and detailing, to illustrate its associations with minor patterns of commercial design and development from the 1920s. The building retains its integrity with its Spanish Eclectic design, including its asymmetrical form, gabled and flat roof, and materials. Additions have occurred to the building but do not impair the visual integrity of the building from the public right-of-way.
